

Informal meeting of the Plenary to commemorate the eightieth anniversary of the signing of the Charter of the United Nations

No choice is left but to promote multilateralism, and to eradicate multiple-standard policies and unilateral actions. They are the root causes of the constant and increasing violations of all the rights of the Palestinian people and its genocide.

Humanity progress economy must replace war-based economy. It is the only long term, viable and realistic approach. Security cannot replace peace.

Tunisia will continue to be among the strongest defenders of the Charter and its spirit.

No aggression or wars from our part, never.

What we say is what we do or can do.

Military force and suspicious financial short term interests should never be predominant driving forces in international affairs.

All military empires last just for a limited period of time before disappearing.

Greater civilizations produce art and ideas that push humanity to higher levels.

One cannot seriously claim democracy and human values for its own people, while at the same time provoking or cautioning violence, mass killings and chaos outside its own borders.

Mr. President,

We must not accept to be in a similar or worse situation to the one that led to the UN's creation. At that time, the killing of millions of innocent civilians was a final point to the worst human tragedy.

The current situation should not remain as another starting point for destruction of life and the planet, at a much larger scale.
